



LOCAL RULES & SKGA TERMS OF COMPETITION (Hard Card)

The following Local Rules and Terms of Competition, together with any additions or amendments published by the Slovak Golf Association (SKGA) at the golf course, will apply to all Competitions run by the SKGA.

For the full text of any Local Rule referenced below, please refer to the Official Guide to the Rules of Golf effective January 2023 and the Clarifications updated quarterly by The R&A, available at www.randa.org.

Unless otherwise noted, the penalty for breach of a Local Rule is the general penalty (loss of hole in match play or two penalty strokes in stroke play).

1. Out of Bounds (Rule 18-2)

- a) A ball is out of bounds when all of it is outside the boundary edge of the course.
- b) The ball is out of bounds when it is behind the white stakes or white line.
- c) If inside outs are applied and a situation occurs where an out applies to only one of the two holes between which it runs, the stake is painted black on the side of the hole to which the out does not apply. When playing on this hole, the out stake is considered an immovable obstruction and is eligible for free relief under Rule 16.1b
- d) A ball is out of bounds when it is beyond any wall defining a boundary.
- e) Closed gates attached to boundary walls and fences are part of the boundary object. Relief is not allowed from such a gate under Rules 15.2 or 16.1. An open gate is not treated as part of the boundary object and may be closed or moved to a different position.

2. Penalty Areas (Rule 17)

- a) When a penalty area adjoins a boundary, the penalty area edge extends to and coincides with the boundary.
- b) When a player's ball is found in or it is known or virtually certain to have come to rest in any penalty area where the ball last crossed the edge of the penalty area at a point that coincides with the boundary of the course, opposite side relief is available under Model Local Rule B-2.1.

Dropping Zones for Penalty Areas

Where a dropping zone is marked for a penalty area, it is an additional option for relief under penalty of one stroke. The dropping zone is a relief area. A ball must be dropped in and come to rest in the relief area

3. Abnormal Course Conditions (including Immovable Obstructions) (Rule 16)

- a) Ground Under Repair
 - (1) Any area bounded by a white line or a dotted white line.
 - (2) Any area of damaged ground (e.g. caused by vehicle movement) that is considered by a referee to be abnormal.
 - (3) French drains (stone-filled drainage ditches).
 - (4) Seams of cut turf; Model Local Rule F-7 is in effect.
 - (5) Yardage painted lines or dots on the putting green or in a part of the general area cut to fairway height or less are to be treated as ground under repair from which relief is available under Rule 16.1. Interference does not exist if yardage painted lines or dots only interfere with the player's stance.

b) Immovable Obstructions

- (1) White lined areas and the immovable obstruction they tie into are treated as a single abnormal course condition.
- (2) Landscaped garden areas and everything growing in them that are surrounded by an immovable obstruction are treated as a single abnormal course condition.
- (3) Mats that are secured.
- (4) Roads or paths surfaced with woodchip or mulch. Individual pieces of woodchip are loose impediments.
- (5) Immovable Obstructions Close to Putting Greens. Model Local Rule F-5.1 is in effect.

c) Embedded Ball

Rule 16.3 is modified in this way: no free relief is allowed for a ball embedded in the stacked turf or soil faces above a bunker.

4. Integral Objects

The following are integral objects from which free relief is not allowed:

- a) bunker liners in their intended position;
- b) wires, cables, wrappings or other objects where they are closely attached to trees or other permanent objects;
- c) artificial retaining walls and pilings when located in penalty areas.

5. Player May Remove Animals Not Defined As Loose Impediments From near Ball

Model Local Rule E-13 is in effect.

6. Temporary Immovable Obstructions

Model Local Rule F-23, with any additions or amendments in the additional Local Rules published by the Committee is in effect.

7. Clubs and Balls

- a) List of Conforming Driver Heads: Model Local Rule G-1 is in effect.
Penalty for making a stroke with a club in breach of Local Rule: Disqualification.
- b) List of Conforming Golf Balls: Model Local Rule G-3 is in effect.
Penalty for breach of the Local Rule: Disqualification.

8. Prohibiting Use of Materials to Help Read the Line of Play for Stroke from Putting Green

Model Local Rule G-12 is in effect. Rule 4.3a is modified in this way: During a round, a player must not use any written, printed, electronic or digital materials to help with reading their line of play for any stroke to be made from the putting green.

9. Pace of Play Policy (Rule 5.6b)

A group is out of position when it has completed play of a hole (meaning that the ball of the last player in the group to hole out has been removed from the hole) later than the maximum allowable time given (see time chart) and it has not maintained the starting interval with the group ahead of it.

- 1 bad time
Player will be warned by the referee and told that, if they has a further bad time, they will be penalised.

c) Excessive Shot Time

At any time, if any player is observed by a referee taking more than 120 seconds to play a shot, they will be notified of the excessive shot time and given an official warning to speed up play. The player will also be advised that the Committee may start individual timing at any time, even if the group is not out of position.

10. Suspension of Play (Rule 5.7)

The following signals will be used to suspend and resume play:

- immediate stop for imminent danger - one prolonged note of a siren
- stop for a non-dangerous situation - three consecutive notes of a siren
- resumption of play - two consecutive notes of a siren.

Note: when play is stopped for imminent danger, all practice areas will be immediately closed.

11. Practicing on Course Before or Between Rounds (Rule 5.2)

Model Local Rule I-1.1 is in effect. Rule 5.2a is modified in this way: A player must not practice on the competition course before or between rounds. Model Local Rule I-1.2 is in effect. Rule 5.2b is modified in this way: A player must not practice on the competition course before or between rounds.

12. Practicing During Round or While Play Is Stopped (Rule 5.5)

Model Local Rule I-2 is in effect. Rule 5.5b is modified in this way: Between the play of two holes, a players must not:

- Make any practice stroke on or near the putting green of the hole just completed, or
- Test the surface of that putting green by rubbing the putting green or rolling a ball

13. Transportation

In all Championship and Matches conducted by the SKGA, players must walk throughout the round. No form of motorised transportation will be permitted except as authorised or later approved by the Committee. A player who will play, or has played, under penalty of stroke and distance is always authorised to ride on motorised transportation.

The player gets the general penalty for each hole during which there is a breach. A breach between two holes applies to the next hole.

14. Caddies

Caddies are allowed for all individual events. Caddie must not be a PRO player. Caddies in the team events – depends on the terms and conditions of each event.

15. Team Captains and Advice in Team Competitions (Rule 24)

- a) Team Captain (Rule 24.3) Each team must nominate a team captain who must be an amateur golfer in accordance with the Rules of Amateur Status as approved by R&A Rules Limited.

Penalty for Breach of Local Rule: disqualification of team.

Procedure if a team has not nominated a team captain: the player whose surname comes first alphabetically will automatically be appointed the team captain.

- b) Advice (Rule 24.4)

Two advice givers may be named by each team from whom players in the team may ask and receive advice. The first must be the team captain (see 14a) and the second may or may not be a professional golfer. The advice givers must be identified to the Committee via the "Registration Form" prior to the start of the Championship and must remain unchanged for the duration of the championship unless agreed by the Championship Committee under exceptional circumstances.

Penalty for Breach of Local Rule: The advice giver in breach of the Local Rule will lose their advice giver status for the remainder of the championship and be subject to sanction from the SKGA Disciplinary Committee.

The advice givers must not walk on the putting green at any time. When the ball of a team player lies on the putting green, the advice givers are prohibited from giving advice for strokes to be made from the putting green.

Penalty for Breach of Local Rule: general penalty.

The advice givers must not ride on any form of motorised transportation during play except as authorised or later approved by the Committee.

Penalty for Breach of Local Rule:

first breach: warning;

subsequent breach: loss of advice giver status.

16. Eligibility

Players must meet the eligibility provisions established in the relevant Terms of Competition for the specific Championship or Match.

17. Anti-Doping

Players are required to comply with and be bound by the Anti-Doping Policy that is established by the International Golf Federation. Any competitors who are taking medication and in doubt as to their clinical status should seek advice from the EGA Office no later than 30 days before the start of the championship.

18. Modification of Penalty Under Rule 3.3b(2) for Missing Player or Marker Certification

Model Local Rule L-1 is in effect.

19. Returning of Score Card

A player's scorecard is officially returned to the Committee when the player has physically left the recording office/area.

While the above is the strict definition, for additional guidance on whether a group is maintaining its position on the group in front, it will not be doing so if it:

- I. Reaches a par-3 hole that is clear of play and all players in the group in front of them have played their strokes from the teeing area of the next hole.
- II. Reaches a par-4 or par-5 hole that is not clear of play but that becomes clear of play before all players in the group have played their strokes from the teeing area.
- III. Reaches a par-4 or par-5 hole that is clear of play.

Note: If a ruling or some other legitimate delay occurs that causes the group in question to be out of position, that group is expected to regain its position within a reasonable time

Players are both allowed and encouraged to play out of turn (“Ready Golf”) in a safe and responsible way under Rule 6.4b(2) at any time but especially when their group is out of position.

b) Procedure when Group is Out of Position

- I. If a group is out of position, it will be given an official warning to speed up play
- II. If the group does not get back into position and a decision is taken to time the group, each player in the group will be subject to individual timing by a referee. Each player in the group will be advised that they are “out of position” and are being timed.
- III. The maximum time allocated per shot is 40 seconds. 10 extra seconds are allowed for the first player to play:
 - a stroke on a par 3 hole
 - a second stroke on a par 4 or par 5 hole
 - a third stroke on a par 5 hole
 - a stroke from around the putting green; and
 - a stroke from on the putting green

The timing will start when a player has had sufficient time to reach their ball, it is their turn to play and they are able to play without interference or distraction. On the putting green, timing will start when the player has had a reasonable amount of time to lift, clean and replace their ball, repair damage and move loose impediments on their line of play. Time spent looking at the line from beyond the hole and/or behind the ball and aligning the ball will count as part of the time taken for the next stroke.

- IV. Timing ceases when a group is back in position and players will be advised accordingly.

Note: in some circumstances, an individual player, or two players within a group of three, may be timed instead of the entire group.

Penalty for Breach of Policy: “Bad times” are carried through an entire stroke play championship. For example, a player who gets a “bad time” in Round 1 (a warning) will get one penalty stroke if they get a second bad time either later in Round 1 or during any subsequent round of the championship. In match play, bad times only apply to a specific match.

20. Deciding Ties

The method for deciding ties is provided on the relevant Terms of Competition.

21. Results of Match or Championship - Competition Closed

a) Match Play

The result of a match is officially announced when it has been recorded in the Championship Office.

b) Stroke Play

When the Championship trophy is presented to the winner, the results of the competition are officially announced, and the competition is closed.

22. Behaviour

Players, captains and advice givers, should conduct themselves in a disciplined manner, demonstrating courtesy and sportsmanship at all times. Behaviour of the very highest order is expected by all players, captains or advice givers towards everyone involved in the Championship. Any player, captain or advice giver breaching the SKGA Conduct Guidelines may be subject to disciplinary action by the Championship Committee and Disciplinary Committee SKGA.

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
